


WinkWorld August/September 2010

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Magic Happens: This Time in Mallorca

It's true, a bit of magic happened again: This time on the island of Mallorca, which is a Spanish state in the Mediterranean. The 24 students in class spoke 28 different languages and lived in a total of 34 different countries.

This group truly lived the Mark Twain belief that, "Travel is fatal to prejudice, bigotry, and narrow-mindedness, and many of our people need it sorely—broad, wholesome, charitable views—can not be acquired by vegetating in one's little corner of earth (1869)." Thank you to Karalee Ruelas for bringing that quotation to my attention at the very moment I needed it.

The Story of Zhanna

Zhanna, in many ways, was a symbol for me of not only the diversity of our class, but also the collaborative nature of the group. First, Zhanna grew up in Kazakhstan; as a young woman she came to Mississippi and married a young Mississippian; they now live and work in India.

I always noticed that the entire class immediately and consistently collaborated so that Zhanna always had the physical help getting to all summer school and class events.

Zhanna and her Mississippian husband have the most beautiful young boy, Dylan, who came to our class almost daily.



Yes, they road their horses to school.




They played on the slide.

They lined up.


They put their clean, new backpacks in their cubbies,
