Rubric for sharing students "outside of class" reading

1. Author's name and title of book is given.
2. Theme is discussed clearly. There is no doubt about the author's main message.

3. Main character's actions, thoughts, feelings, relationship to others, others'
relationship to her, and words are identified and show the connection to the overall theme.
4. Speaker explains how the setting connects to the main plot.
5. All elements of plot are clearly delineated and discussed in enough detail to give
the listener a detailed summary.
6. Speaker identifies the main conflict.
7. Best part of the book is discussed.
8. Part of the book that could have been improved (and why) is discussed?
9. Good eye contact, voice control, countenance, and attitude appropriately
expresses the tone of the topic.
10. Speaker read an excerpt that adequately expresses an aspect of the book that
was discussed.
