I am so tired of teacher bashing, and it almost always comes from people who could never make it for a day, much less a week in a classroom.




Several years ago, I wrote:

Now, when people ask me what I do, I have one of two answers. If I want privacy, I tell them I am a professor. Apparently, not many want to talk to a professor, and thus I happily get to read or write during the rest of the flight. However, if I feel like listening to someone, I respond that I am a rancher's wife. Almost everyone has nice things to say to a rancher's wife. keyes, both statements are true. In addition, yes, I am still a teacher.



This teacher-bashing must stop. The sudden interest in education and educational reform is having a deadly impact on educators who are now the scapegoats for all social, economic, and political ills of our society. The result is that education is held hostage; administrators are held hostage; teachers are held hostage; students are held hostage; learning is held hostage. 




Second, Hannah tried to implement some critical and creative learning activities in her own classroom of children. See what Ameera created from this assignment.


